Funding Sources

- Local arts agencies
- Local aging or social services agencies
- □ Foundations:
 - Community foundations
 - Private foundations


Local Arts Agencies

- Mission: foster the arts at the local level
- Go by various names (agencies, councils, commissions, united arts funds)
- Many make grants to:
 - nonprofits for art-focused projects
 - individual artists for fellowships, residencies, etc.

To Find Your Local Arts Agency

Visit Americans for the Arts (www.americansforthearts.org)

- Go to "Arts Services Directory"
- Under "organization type" choose LAA
- Type in your location



Aging or Human Services Agencies

- Government entities
- Some give grants to nonprofits to deliver services or reach underserved populations (e.g. older adults, people with dementia)
- Search agency websites or news releases to find possible grant programs

Community Foundations

- Make grants in a specific geographic area
- Work for community betterment
 - Generally have certain focuses (e.g. health, education, arts/culture, environment, etc.)
 - Your project needs to fit within their areas of interest

Private Foundations

- Foundations created by endowments from individuals, families, companies
- Make grants to achieve specific purposes.

Examples of foundations' missions:

Helen Bader Foundation (Wisconsin): "...expand critical services for people with Alzheimer's disease with a focus on underserved communities."

The SCAN Foundation (California): "...transform care for older adults in ways that preserve dignity and encourage independence."

Searching for Funders

You want to identify funders:

- Whose priorities align with the goals of your arts program.
- Who make grants to organizations like yours.
- Who make grants in your geographic area.






Narrowing the list

Check Funder's 990-PF

- IRS return that private foundations must file annually
- Lists grant awards, among other things.
- Search 990-PF's free at Foundation Center website


- □ Total giving: \$1.3 million (2014)
- Types, locations of grantees: (include arts, health-care, disease-focused organizations)
- Typical grant range:\$1,000-\$25,000

Contact the funder

- After you've done your homework, contact prospective funders to:
 - Clarify any unanswered questions
 - See if they feel your program is a possible fit
 - Get advice/tips on submitting an application

Writing the Proposal

- Clearly explain how your project fits the funder's goals
- □ Follow the "3 C's":
 - Make the proposal Clear, Concise and Compelling



Show Your Program's Impact

- Use quotes to show human impact
- Cite research findings



Address Funder Stereotypes

Many funders still assume that arts-in-aging programs are "macaroni crafts at the senior center."

Address Other Funder Concerns

Funders want to know:

- Evaluation: How you will assess the program's success?
- Sustainability: How you will support the program when the grant is finished?

Include Supporting Items

- □ Photos of artwork
- □ Videos
- Letters of support
 - Original
 - Heartfelt



When You Receive Word...

- If the proposal isn't funded, find out why.
- If you get the grant, congratulations!
- Work on making this the "beginning of a beautiful relationship."



What is OMA?



OMA is an intergenerational art program for people with dementia, developed at **Scripps** Gerontology Ctr.









Why implement OMA?

- OMA meets OHIO Quality Improvement Project requirement to renew nursing home license
- OMA improves quality of life of people with dementia
- OMA improves volunteers attitudes toward aging and people with dementia

What funding is available for OMA in Ohio?

Thanks to Ohio Department of Medicaid, we have:

- \$1500/nursing home for art supplies
- 3 night lodging and mileage (no flights) for up to 4 team members from nursing home that are located greater than 50 miles from Oxford, Ohio
- \$600/person registration is required and it is NOT part of the ODM funding.

Who is eligible to apply for funding?

- Must be licensed as an Ohio nursing homes with Medicaid certification
- For profit & non-profit facilities may apply
- Must be a new OMA site
- Sites that have discontinued OMA may apply
- Different nursing homes under the same organization may apply separately

Training Logistics

The first cohort will be trained in Oxford, OH on:

- May 22-25 or June 5-8, 2017
- □ Day 1: 5-8 pm, Days 2-4: 8 am 5:30 pm
- Trainees will receive all tools to do OMA successfully.
- CEUs are available from:
 - NAB (20.5 hours)
 - BELTSS (19 hours)
 - NCCAP (13.25 hours)
 - NCCDP (20.5 hours)
 - CSWMFT (6.5 hours)



Who should attend OMA training?

- Administrators
- Resident life staff, activity directors
- Special care unit managers, DON
- Volunteer coordinators
- Local artists
- Service learning educators as partners (no need to be employed by the nursing home to join the team)
- Non-Ohioans can attend training, but no funding is available

Next steps

- Application deadline: Nov. 14, 2016
- 14 facilities will be selected in the first cohort.

- A hybrid program for the next cohorts will be available in 2017-19 (combination of online training and a 1-day in-person training in key Ohio cities)
- 2017-18: 34 facilities
- 2018-19: 54 facilities


